


smiles to the faces of spectators and participants alike, adding a unique charm to the event.







Sharmila C. Chatterjee, a business-to-business marketing specialist, uses survey research and econometric methodologies to investigate challenges in the realms of distribution channels, sales force management, and relationship marketing. She conducted some of the earliest research in the vital area of sales-marketing interaction, especially sales lead management. Interested in the education of B2B Marketing and Sales, she travelled to Woxsen University to deliver lectures to business management students on B2B marketing in the post-pandemic corporate world in the second week of March, 2023.

During the interview session with her, she gave us an insight into her life. One could call her life a rollercoaster of flexibility. Initially, her main

focus was not the field she's specialized in; and getting in Birla Institute of Technology and Science, Pilani, to take up courses related to foundational engineering was the least of her expectations. However, working for 6 months in Faridabad in the finance sector had dulled her passion- she had wished to dabble in something more adventurous than filling out paperwork of balance sheets and financial statements every day, and so a doctoral degree at The Wharton School, University of Pennsylvania in the field of B2B marketing, specifically, was her next stop.

Unlike regular business transactions between an organization or a company and an individual, B2B refers to complex transactions done between two organizations that could take up to 6-36 months to get completed, along with a large group of a dozen (sometimes half a dozen or fewer for smaller sales) people engaged in the undertaking. If there is one thing quite evident in this interaction, it's that Mrs. Sharmila prefers a headstrong challenge over anything else. "But I loved marketing, so it was worth the twists and turns that happened along the way."

Apparently, the concept of 'tough love' is a unanimous agreement between universities globally when it comes to preparing graduate students for the workforce. The rigorous, foundational training BITS, Pilani had put Mrs. Sharmila under, helped her tremendously in the process of working towards her postgraduate degree in Pennsylvania. The functioning of this relies on similar cogs of a machine; whether you are a graduate student or a postgraduate student, you must constantly be prepared for the next unexpected turn that life may take.

Apart from the institutions' ideals and beliefs we grow up around, it is true no matter where we stand as of now; our parents also always have a huge influence on how far we have come. When



asked about where her primary source of inspiration stems from - "Oh my god, my mom!" she exclaimed. "I couldn't be more grateful (for her). My life and career path would be completely different if not for her forward thinking." At an extremely young age, particular health problems had rendered her inefficient enough to even pursue an education, or so they had predicted. Throughout the years, it took multiple doctors' visits and a major surgery for her to come out of that slump, but it would not have been possible to do so without the relentless support of her extremely encouraging family.

And by the time the fifth and final why is reached, the solution is already present.

"We want to be the Amitabh Bacchans of training."

The solution in this particular scenario was them and the problem was people who needed to communicate.

But it isn't just the name that holds this much meaning. It's the logo as well. The Tally Marks logo embodies the values of simplicity,



accuracy, and ease of implementation, while the careful selection of royal blue and yellow colors represents the characteristics of intellect, quality, and elegance.

Verbatim, one of them said that the process of learning communication is ongoing and never truly finished, as it is a lifelong endeavor.

Their vision is to upskill individuals for better career opportunities and transform lives as a result and their mission is to provide live and customized training to help people create an impact, additionally, it is to also empower professionals to scale up their careers. It is fair to say they have been quite successful in doing so.

On the 9th of March there was a Cancer Awareness session hosted by Club Ignite, Dr. Vijay Karan Reddy interacted with students and provided information about the disease. He talked about, different types of cancer, how to tackle every type, and how to prevent them. After all, it was an interactive session on cancer awareness.

Every type of cancer was explained thoroughly and it was mentioned that there are over 100 types of cancer, each having its potency. Cancer is a lifestyle disease. A massive 85% of cancer cases are caused by lifestyle choices. And the second leading cause of cancer is unsurprisingly tobacco. Being the cause of 47% of cases, tobacco is known to be the cause of almost 13 types of cancer. In 2020, up to 1,392,179 cases of cancer were reported in India, which is an indicator of how uncontrolled the disease has become. As per the doctor's presentation, there are five leading sites of cancer- breast, lung, mouth, cervix, uteri and tongue. It was established that cancer can easily be prevented by making healthy lifestyle choices.

However, healthy lifestyle choices cannot prevent cancer per se, genetics also play a major role in the formation of cancer cells in one's body. As prevention is not possible in such cases,

identification and treatment are the next best step. In the session, many methods were showcased on how to self-identify-if not medically. As breast cancer is one of the highest cases of cancer cases, several methods were presented on how to self-identify. Despite lifestyle choices and external harm being factors for the formation of cancer in people, age is also a major factor in the formation of cancer. In recent times, the population on the older end of the spectrum has faced a rise in cancer cases. There are a few procedures to tackle these, such as radiation therapy, chemotherapy, and immunotherapy. These procedures have proven to be safe and effective as the cancer is usually not only eliminated but the risk of it returning is minimized to a null amount.

In conclusion, cancer is a disease that can be tackled and eradicated with the right treatment. Increased awareness and knowledge about the disease can help prevent it, and identifying it at an early stage can increase the chances of successful treatment. Club Ignite's session on cancer awareness was an excellent initiative towards educating people about the disease and ways to tackle it. Spotlight on rural Telangana - Bhudhera village

In this month's edition of "Spotlight on Villages", an initiative by the school of humanities to bring awareness to the rural economies, putting their well-being and functioning at the forefront, we - Sujal Reddy, Asha Jyothi and Vedehi Parashar - interviewed SMT. P. NAGALAXMI panchayat secretary of the village Budhera on April 4, 2023. The interview was primarily centred around the schemes implemented in regards to village development and the administration side of the panchayat. Mrs. Nagalaxmi has been working in the field for nearly 18 years, recently being appointed as the secretary at Budhera two years ago. She entered the field out of necessity at the time and since then has found the profession to be extremely satisfying, with no reason to resign any time soon. An interesting tidbit we learnt was her being the officer who approved the establishment of the Woxsen School of Business during its early days.

To give some perspective on the little community close to our university, there are 3515 residents, of which nearly 80% are dependent on agriculture with a primary focus on cotton crops. The townspeople have diverse cultural backgrounds, with people of many religions residing, but most of them belong to backward classes. Nearly 75% of the population is literate(i.e. they can sign documents and read) and education is also a primary focus of the panchayat, so most are well versed with technology too.

When asked about the decisions and actions that the secretary is responsible for, she mentioned that it mostly involves issuing birth and death certificates to ward members; sanitation projects and awareness campaigns, restrooms in particular; and erecting street lighting on all roadways and their maintenance afterwards too and finally, also implementing government schemes and awareness plans. She also added that despite these being the main objective, in her 18+ years of service as a secretary, she has had to overlook and supervise various other activities around localities.

Regarding the village's educational system, there are 4 public schools and 2 private ones, and practically all of the children from every family attend them, resulting in a low dropout rate. They also do not

lack opportunities for higher education, as there are established high schools and universities around the village with many more coming up with the rapid urbanisation which is a positive sign of development. On the other hand however, many youngsters between the ages of 18 and 25 are currently unemployed and wander aimlessly without contributing or putting in efforts towards earning a livelihood. The panchayat has made it a priority to set up future generations to succeed and based on the results we saw, they appear to be on the right path.

The Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employment Guarantee Act (MGNREGA) employs nearly 105 workers everyday and they earn nearly Rs.252 for a day's work, with nearly 90 different types of activities in which they could be employed - ranging from road maintenance to highway greenery maintenance. Sanitation in the locality has also widely improved with the Swachh Bharat Abhiyan taking centre stage and panchayats cracking down on open defecation. The government to provide toilets to every household was a major success with nearly 95% of the households now having access to toilets. The only regret or rather change the secretary would like to see in her time at office is laying an underground drainage/sewage system spanning the entire village for a cleaner society. There are various self-help groups established to promote employment among women and also promote entrepreneurship among the villages, also helping to provide a sense of security. The village has access to 5 major banks, so the problem of limited financial services or knowledge is non-existent and as such, provides a financial blanket to the villagers in need during droughts or floods, as the population is predominantly agro-based.

To conclude, the initiative was really fun and helped us gain a new perspective on the running of villages and the hardships that are faced on a day-to-day basis, in the process also helping promote the villages and bringing their issues and achievements alike to a wider audience. We hope that Budhera becomes an example to other villages and vice versa; we also urge the student community to involve themselves in social service and help in any way they can.

Samridhi Shoor, the Founder and CEO of House of Krifin, a 21st Century Auction House for Rare, High-End NFT Art, Music, and Collectibles; Connected artists and collectors through blockchain technology to easily sell, invest, and own art and collectibles gave a webinar on the following topics: the implications of NFT on ownership. An industry insight on what constitutes an NFT as a luxury product and incentives to prefer them over traditional products. the making of Krifin as a no-code metaverse platform. An insider view on the future of Metaverse and the progression of business technology.

Keen insight on gaining knowledge and expertise in the industry be it through the recommendation of programming languages like Solidity, an in-depth explanation of the necessity of a diverse portfolio, or the importance of carefully evaluating white papers. Miss Shoor provided information about the XROS fellowship program, about the differences between pooling, staking, mining, and minting, and gave an overview of the skillsets being valued in the industry.

The invention relates to the field of an energy storage, and more specifically to a supercapacitor-based energy storage systems for smoothing out the output power variations of solar photovoltaic systems to power household devices in remote areas. The supercapacitors-based energy storage system for powering household devices in remote areas includes a solar photovoltaic (PV) panel for generating power, a fuzzy logic controller-based Maximum Power Point Tracking (MPPT) system for operating the PV panel at the available maximum power point (MPP), a Supercapacitor for storing energy, a fuzzy logic-based proportional integral (PI) charge controller for charging the Supercapacitor with constant current and suitable voltage for fast charge and better power smoothing, and a Buck-Boost converter for providing the constant current and suitable voltage to the Supercapacitor.
