
2. SOH faculty invited as Speaker

For The Students, By The Students

Autism, There's more to it than the internet definition. Why don't we "Ask Ana" about it!

Abhishek Ponneri, the CEO, and Co-Founder, and Laaysa Priya who's the CFO, HR Head, and Co-Founder of the start-up, called Ask Ana. We had

an intriguing conversation about what they have built. We started with a short spell out on the start-up, and what does the name 'Ask Ana' mean?! Abhishek proceeds, "Ana, is the goddess of nourishment and well-being in Irish Mythology. Ana doubles up as an A.I. assistant where the autistic kids' tantrums are to be understood and controlled, where their parents give us the feedback and we act accordingly. Our essential aim is to cut down the trips to the therapist which would cost them around 15-30 thousand per month. We work for kids, with Autism, ADHD, and Intellectual disabilities who feel physical discomfort". He adds with a smile, "This is where we play".

When asked how did they come up with this idea? (Abhishek sighed)" My nephew is suffering from ASD (Autistic syndrome disorder)", he says. I have been with him ever since I was a kid. I was petrified of his meltdown episodes. The layer of cream on his milk was enough to trigger him to throw the glass, scream at the top of his lungs, hit the walls, and destroy tangible things. In this way, he was hurting himself badly, as he wasn't able to communicate his level of agitation. Over the years, it led me to examine his behavior from a first-person standpoint and this gave me compassion in reaching out to people who fall under the spectrum, that was the motive that brought me all the way here."

Laaysa adds, "Not many know the actual meaning of Autism, I'm not talking about the internet definition (she strongly addresses), when Abhishek told us about his nephew, it triggered our team, which accompanied us to dig deeper into this malady. Hence 'Ask Ana' came to light."

We put out a question on how they would play in society, Abhishek started with, "Firstly, a product that relives the child's tantrums and pressure

craving patterns. For example here's what a hypo-sensitive autistic kid would do (in most which plays as deep pressure therapy sensory toy

cases) if they burnt their hand, they might get on pleasure out of it, and they are most likely to do it again. We want to add our role here, which is to satisfy their pressure craving thereby drawing a complete tangent to tantrums because autism contradicts self-control; just because they do not have control over their surroundings, which develops the pressure craving and tantrums that usually ends up in a catastrophe. So if we could keep the nerve endings satisfied, it would be an accomplishment in most parts."

"Secondly, a strap-on apparatus that would detect, Blood-Oxygen concentration level, Blood Pressure, fall detection, and SOS button linked to the parents' phones so they could be alerted for the tight spot."

"Thirdly, we are working on building an autism community in Hyderabad. opinion on interviews being the worst way to build a team as we wouldn't know the person in depth, as it's very superficial. Around 70% of the team members have been scouted personally. "There was a heart-to-heart conversation on their perspectives, emotions, and encounters with Autism, on the other hand, we took a completely different approach for the research team. They were interviewed, followed by a written test where they were given cases on inequality in pay for women or solutions for disability comfort management. We had quite an interesting time with the answers we received" Abhishek said. "We are a team of 14, four are product designers, one

on is an independent contributor for branding, three on social media, and three in the research team" Laasya points out with a tsmirk "Including the us, the management".

Coming to the end, here was our final query, we asked how long has it been introducing 'Ask Ana' and what hardships they have faced. Abhishek answers while leaning back on his chair," It's been solid four months since we began. The hardship, unfortunately, is that we aren't able to come up with a possible way to go out as a group and reach out to the Autistic community, as they are completely volatile, and examining their day-to-day activities is demanding great exertion as that would require resources. As of now, we are bootstrapping."

"We are endlessly working on bringing together the resources and sending our team members to do the primary research. Our secondary research is on air; we have circulated questionnaires for the parents, primary caregivers, and shadow teachers of the autistic community so that they would give us more insights on their experience and emotions while dealing with autistic kids."

Ask Ana aims to pilot in the April of 2023.

Mental health is a shunned topic in our country.

Woxsen University, however, has evidently made moves in bringing the subject into mainstream conversations through the engaging Human Library series and the philanthropic Elevate Programme.

And whose altruistic efforts do we have to thank?

Ms. Anubha Jain,

a newly recruited Psychology counselor at the **Student Wellness Cell** at Woxsen University.

Her uplifting nature is immediately apparent, complimenting Woxsen Times on its presentation and content even before her self-introduction.

And then, she goes on to tell her story-

Born and raised in the city of **Kolkata**, her passion and interest for the human mind stem way back in higher secondary school.

Despite the resistance and eyebrows, the subject raised at the time, her family's receptiveness empowered her to indulge further. And there was no stopping her from then on. She has been beefing up her knowledge of human behavior ever since.

On the other hand, Ms. Anubha Jain's fateful entry into Woxsen university is an ordinary story. After working online with research-based organizations during the pandemic, she craved a more hands-on experience, leading her to meet with **Dr. Raul Rodriguez**. And its domino effect has led to this interview.

The profound experiences she's had after working with multiple NGOs and research-based organizations spread across **Mumbai** and **Bangalore** have sharpened her understanding of the field.

So, if you ask her for the meaning of therapy, ask her to break it down in layperson's terms- it's a space for you to work, grow, and overcome what you have been struggling with.

"It's a collaborative process between a client and a professional to reach a common goal. The professional is an empathetic listener who provides a safe space for the client," she further explains, calling it a teacher's instinct to provide a technical explanation, nevertheless.

So, what is the role of a university counselor, you ask?

"Students at this stage of life are experiencing a dramatic transition from school to university; it's a complete change of scene. And apart from this struggle for adaptability, they might also be struggling with personal issues apart from mental health, such as family issues, financial troubles, etc. And often, students do not reach out for help. This is where the role of the college counselor plays in; we encourage them to seek that help."

Ms. Anubha Jain says, "Healthy body cannot exist without a sound mind." But are we on the right path to understanding this?"

Are we there yet?

I don't think so.

But are we on the path toward something? We sure are.

We've come a long way from the days of conversion therapy and other baseless practices. Now the conversation revolves around inclusivity and being empathetic. So, we're on the right track of getting there, **slowly**.

"Society is of the idea that an individual seeking professional help is 'weak.'
But there is strength in that vulnerability that many are incapable of handling."
Ms. Jain, however, very expertly rationalizes the idea of holding on to stigmas,
"It's unfair to blame individuals who hold on to stigma as it has been
ingrained in them from a very young age."

There are two preventive measures to tackle this-

Providing education on the concept and benefits of therapy

Breaking down the myths at the education level; this involves conversations at home and school.

There are two steps she recommends for change at the University level:

- a. Be mindful of the language we use. It's easy to slip up a joke without harmful intentions. However, the language one uses has a substantial impact on impressionable individuals.
- b. Understand that **it is not cool to shame**. And this transcends into a person's physical as well as mental struggles.

Ms. Anubha Jain's work at Woxsen University is continual; it has merely started. But her impact is conspicuous.

Every one of us can create a safe space- be empathetic, be mindful, and provide a listening ear.

In this manner, we're all part of the Student Wellness Cell.

A Synonymous Identity

India's cultural fabric is an eclectic mix of the festivals we celebrate. Albeit, distinct celebrations, there is a synonymous identity in every festival we honor. From the Kunjak Puja observed in the north, Ghatasthapana and Dusherra observed in the South, Navrati in the west, and Durga puja in the east, but the crux of the story is one and the same- to revere and pay homage to the Hindu goddess, Durga and to celebrate Durga's victory over Mahishasur.

Being away from home, the spirit of celebration often eludes us. Keeping this in mind and wishing to spread the idea of 'inclusivity' during celebrations, the Center of Excellence for Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion, headed by Dr. Kakoli Sen, was on a mission to create a semblance of festive sentiments.

It's well known that no form of expression compares to the anecdotal value of dance. Not to mention the attention performances of Garba, Bhangra, and Dhunuchi reels in, especially when performed at a place as lively as the Admin block. But what is the story behind these nine nights of pujas, dancing, and sharing moments with kinfolks and comrades? Here's a breakdown of the story as told by the four corners of our nation.

North

According to Devi Bhagwat Puran, The Kanjak Puja, or the Kanya Pujan, is performed to honor small girls who are believed to represent Goddess Durga's avatars. This puja, is recognized widely in the northern region of India, and is carried out on the eighth and ninth days of Navratri. Goddess Durga's nine avatars, known as Navadurga, are adored as nine little girls and are treated to special food and gifts.

South

A little down to the South is the Ghatasthapana and Dusherra. Considered the first day of Navratri, Ghatasthapana embarks on a nine-day fasting period. Gifts such as the Aapta leaves, symbolizing gold and prosperity, are exchanged as families get together to celebrate. The day's auspiciousness is also considered a signal to venture into new areas and purchase assets such as houses, vehicles, etc. On the evening of Vijayadashmi,





or the last day of Navratri in Maharashtra, effigies of Ravana are burnt to commemorate the victory of Lord Rama over demon-king Ravana.

West

Taking our journey to the west, we end up in Gujarat, the only state in India that erupts into a nine-night dance festival on the occasion of Navratri, meaning 'nine nights.' Each night is dedicated to the worship of the nine forms of Goddess Durga. Cities and villages are usually abuzz with open spaces to celebrate and honor, Shakti, the feminine divinity. The spectacle of Navratri in Gujarat is considered one of the longest dance festivals in the world.

East

Another remarkable rendition popular in the east is the Durga Puja, similarly organized for ten days in the months of September and October, culturally known as Ashwina. The first day of Durga Puja, known as Mahalaya, symbolizes Goddess Durga's arrival, while celebrations are underway up to the sixth day, known as Sasthi. Over the next three days, the goddess is adored in her three guises- Durga, Laxmi, and Saraswati. On the final day, popularly referred to as Vijayadashmi or the ' tenth day of victory, religious idols are taken in grand processions to nearby rivers where they are submerged in full glory amid loud chants and drumbeats.

This first-edition event organized by the COE for Diversity, Equity, and Inclusivity sure made one thing clear- that they are on a mission to celebrate every difference that binds us.

He is from the pilot batch for WBR and he had been recruited by their mentor, Dr. Neha Gupta. 



{ Edge of life, on a window sill: }


